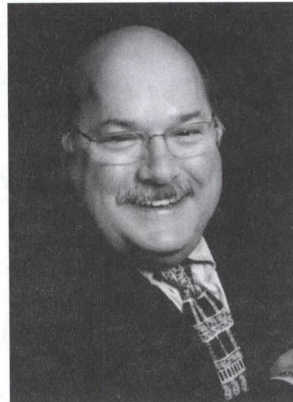

As a community, we have a lot going on and going for us. With your participation we'll see our goals for the community become reality.

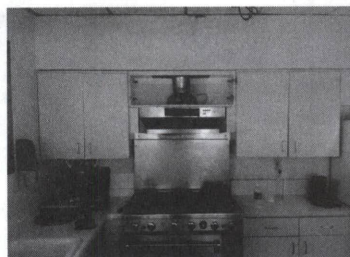

Franklin Fire Station No. 1 Kitchen Makeover

You may recall that the Franklin Fire Department was involved in a nationwide on-line contest last year to win a kitchen makeover for Fire Station No. 1. Although there was tremendous support garnering over 50,000 votes, the Fire Department took second place to a homeless shelter in Minnesota. Even though the Department lost, the contest did bring to light the desperate need for the kitchen to be remodeled. The old kitchen was installed over 25 years ago and had been cheaply constructed. The cabinets were falling apart, making the kitchen essentially non-functional.

Shortly after the contest was over, John Hoppe of Hoppe Woodworks approached the Franklin Fire Department and offered to build and donate custom hardwood cabinets for the kitchen. Mr. Hoppe is a long-time resident of Franklin, with his business located on 27th Street. Hoppe helped to design an updated kitchen that would be more functional. With the help of his crew, he built beautiful cabinets with high-end hardware that will last a long time. Wanting the kitchen to be a showpiece yet understanding budgets, Hoppe was able to get his suppliers to donate and install granite countertops. The cabinets and countertops are better than anything a municipal budget would normally provide for and is greatly appreciated. The kitchen would have been remodeled sooner or later at full cost to the taxpayers, but thanks to John Hoppe the kitchen is a beautiful showpiece that will stand the test of time and at a minimal cost to the taxpayers.

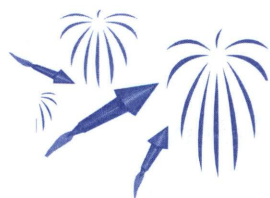

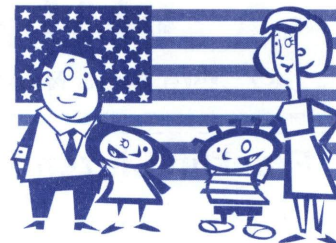

Franklin Citizen Police Academy

Police Chief Rick Oliva has announced Class No. 16 of the Franklin Police Department Citizen Academy which begins Tuesday, September 9th, for 12 consecutive weeks and concludes on Tuesday, November 25, 2014. Classes meet for 3 hours, Tuesday evenings from 6:30 p.m. to 9:30 p.m., usually in the Franklin Police Department community classroom. Additionally, each graduate may participate in a ride-along with officers on the street.

The Franklin Police Department's mission is to establish and maintain a course of instruction for citizens to familiarize themselves with the operations of the Franklin Police Department and the profession of law enforcement. This 12-week academy presents an overview of all aspects of law enforcement such as patrol operations, traffic enforcement, investigations, SWAT, K-9 unit, dispatch/communications, fire and emergency medical services, and much more. Students will have an opportunity to present concerns and questions regarding public safety in the City and learn how citizens and the police can work together to fight crime in the community. Department employees present each session and interact with participants on a very approachable level.

Applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Live or work in the Franklin community (preference is given to Franklin citizens).
- Submit a written application.
- Pass a background check (no felony convictions).
- Be 18 years of age (16 and 17 year olds may attend with parent or guardian).

Summertime Safety

The backyard can be a refreshing way to get some relief from the hot summer sun. More and more people are vacationing in their own backyards where more homes, condos, and subdivisions have pools as an amenity. If you have turned your home into a "stay-cation" hot spot for the summer, please consider reviewing these safety tips that will keep your summer safe and fun.



Pools are a great place to relax, but they can also be dangerous if careful steps aren't taken to ensure that everyone is safe when playing by the pool. Every year, many people drown or are injured in pools. Safety considerations for a safe pool area include:

- Installing a self-closing and self-latching gate.
- Check your pool's anti-entrapment drain covers to make sure they are properly installed.
- Make sure no one swims alone; always have an adult nearby.
- Have life-saving equipment nearby including a rope, life safety rings, and a reaching pole or reaching hook.
- Keep the pool area clear of glass bottles and other potential accidental hazards.
- Be sure that you have easy access to a cell phone or 911 in the event that an emergency occurs in the pool area.

Grilling is another favorite summer pastime. According to the National Fire Protection Association, gas grills have been involved in an average of over 7,000 home fires in the last five years. In addition, charcoal grills have also been susceptible to causing fire damage when improperly attended. Some summertime backyard fire safety tips include:



- Keep grills away from combustible surfaces and off decks.
- Keep small children away from hot grills until completely cooled.
- Let the coals cool completely before disposing of them in a fire safe metal container.
- Wear a heavy apron and use a long-armed oven mitt to protect yourself.
- Have some form of fire extinguishment nearby in the event of a fire.

For apartments and condominiums with balconies:

- Grills are not to be stored or used on balconies.
- Grills must be a minimum of 10 feet away from any building or overhang while in use.

As a reminder to citizens, the City does have an ordinance on open burning. The spring open burning season runs until June 15th and requires a burning permit purchased from Franklin City Hall. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires drinking water utilities to provide an annual Consumer Confidence Report to help consumers understand where their drinking water comes from so they can make informed decisions about their health and protection of the environment.

TREATED WATER QUALITY

Listed on the next page are contaminants detected in Franklin's drinking water during 2013. All detects are less than federal and state regulations allow. Not listed are the nearly 3,000 tests conducted for approximately 150 contaminants that were not found during water testing.

The State Department of Natural Resources allows the Franklin Water Utility to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Some of this data, though representative, is more than one year old.

The information enclosed is based on the testing conducted in the year 2013. Every year testing occurs; results for the year 2014 will be available in the next annual report. The Franklin Water Utility is committed to providing its 7,900 customers with the highest quality drinking water that meets and exceeds standards more stringent than federal and state requirements. Please read this brochure for additional information.

How to Read the Annual Franklin Water Quality Report

1. Read the definitions below the contaminants table to understand this report.
2. Choose a "Contaminant" on the chart.
3. Then check the "Ideal Goal" (Maximum Contaminant Level Goal) for that substance.
4. Note the "Highest Level Allowed" (Maximum Contaminant Level).
5. Compare the contaminant "Level Detected" in Franklin's water supply to the "Ideal Goal" and the "Highest Level Allowed".

DEFINITIONS

AL = Action Level: The concentration of a contaminant that triggers treatment or other requirements, which a water system must follow. Action levels are reported at the 90th percentile for homes at greatest risk.

Maximum Contaminant Level (MCL): The highest level of a contaminant allowed by law in drinking water.

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal (MCLG): The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected health risk.

nd = no detect

NTU = Nephelometric Turbidity Units: a measurement unit of turbidity, or water cloudiness, which is a good indicator of water quality.

pCi/L: Picocuries per liter measure the level of radioactivity in water.

A picocurie is 1012 curies and is the quantity of radioactive material producing 2.22 nuclear transformations per minute.

ppm: Parts per million.

ppb: Parts per billion.

TT = Treatment Technique: A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.

Trihalomethanes: chloroform, bromochloromethane, dibromochloromethane and bromoform.

LEAD AND COPPER

Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with older service lines and home plumbing. The Franklin Water Utility is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to two minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. Drinking water – including bottled water – may be reasonably expected to contain small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does *not* necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA Safe Drinking Water Hotline at **(800) 426-4791**.

SPECIAL HEALTH INFORMATION AVAILABLE

Some people may be more vulnerable to the effects of certain contaminants in drinking water than the

general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice from their health care providers about drinking water. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by *Cryptosporidium* and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline at **(800) 426-4791**.

MOLYBDENUM IN DRINKING WATER

Molybdenum is a metal that naturally occurs in the earth's crust, or found in some manufactured products. In recent sample testing of private wells, molybdenum levels were found to be above the state groundwater standard of 40 ug/L. The Department of Natural Resources (DNR) and health officials recommend residents using private wells instead of municipal water in southeast Wisconsin to test their wells. For more information, simply go to the DNR's website at dnr.wi.gov and type in the keyword "molybdenum".

WATER CONSERVATION

Although tap water is a bargain at \$.473 per 100 gallons when compared to most other products we consume, the total cost of water usage can add up quickly when other factors such as drinking water treatment, facility improvements, wastewater treatment, and the energy used for treating, pumping, and heating water are factored in.

We must also remember that water is a limited resource; we will never have any more water on earth than what we have right now. So while water use is necessary for us to survive and to produce and process most of the products we use on a daily basis, it also pays for us to protect it as a natural resource for use by future generations.

Most water is used in the bathroom. The largest water user in any household is the toilet with 2 to 7 gallons per flush. Flushes account for approximately 27% of the water used in a typical home. Showers, with a flow rate of 2 gallons per minute, account for around 17% of the water used, while other bathroom uses such as baths and faucets account for around 10%. The second highest water user is the washing machine. At around 41 gallons per load, clothes washing accounts for about 22% of the water used in a typical household.

WATER LEAKS

It is estimated that 14% of the water provided to most homes is lost through leaks. This is literally water and money down the drain. **Fix leaks.** Leaking toilets can account for a surprisingly large amount of water, as most leaks are located in the tanks where they can't be seen or heard. A leaking toilet can use as much as 21,600 gallons per month. Leaking faucets, even those with small leaks of 60 drops per minute, can waste around 350 gallons per month*. Most leaks at faucets and toilets can be repaired with simple tools and inexpensive parts available at most hardware stores.

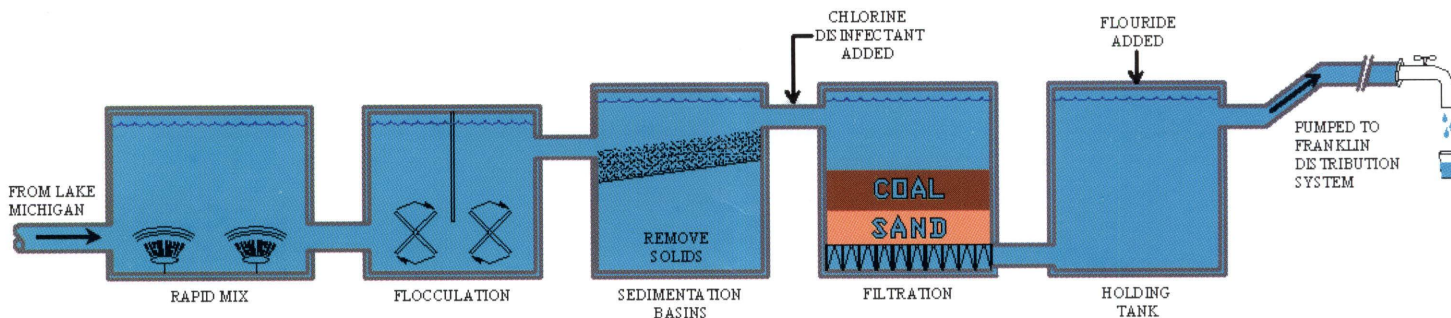
Use more efficient fixtures. Replace inefficient showerheads with low-flow types and faucets fitted with aerators. Even larger items such as toilets, washing machines and dishwashers can pay for themselves in a relatively short period of time by replacing older models with newer, higher efficiency ones. Make older toilets more efficient by placing simple toilet “dams” or a plastic bottle filled with pebbles in the tank.

Use water wisely. Run washing machines and dishwashers only with full loads, or by using lower time and load size selections. Keep a filled pitcher of water in the refrigerator for drinking instead of letting the water run for several minutes to reach the desired temperature. Take shorter showers, turn off the water while brushing your teeth, and put food scraps in the garbage instead of the garbage disposal.

Water lawns & gardens effectively. While perfect looking lawns are nice, it’s natural for grass to be less than bright green during dry periods. If you must water the lawn or garden, do it less frequently and avoid the middle of the day or on sunny, windy days where up to 50% of the water can be lost to evaporation.

Preserving Franklin History

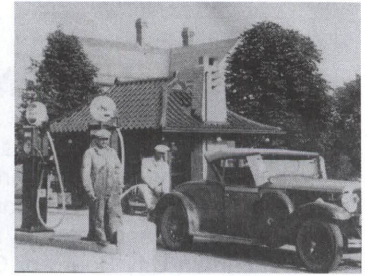
The Franklin Historical Society is always looking for old photos and records that describe the early years of Franklin. The top left photo, for example, was recently given to the Society showing a late 1800's St. Peter's Chapel. The Chapel now resides in the historical park, but once was located on S. 68th Street north of the Polish Center.

St. Peter's Chapel was built in 1869 by families who had left St. Paul's Lutheran Church on S. 51st Street. It remained open until 1883. This photo confirms that the church also served as a school for a time and that the pastor and his wife lived in the upper level. In 1983, the building was moved to the park and is now used for weddings, tours, and annual Christmas services.

Sharing the Roadways—Pedestrians, Bicyclists, Motorists

Nicer weather brings increased outdoor activities such as walking, running, and bicycling. For everyone's safety, pedestrians, bicyclists, and motorists all have certain responsibilities and general rules to follow when sharing the roadways. Below are some of these rules and pointers as outlined by the Wisconsin Department of Transportation. For complete rules and for more detailed information, visit www.dot.wisconsin.gov/safety.

Pedestrians:

- Yield to drivers when crossing a road where there is no intersection or crosswalk or where the pedestrian does not have a green or "walk" signal and where vehicles have a green signal.
- Do not suddenly move into the path of a closely approaching vehicle that does not have sufficient time to yield.
- Walk on and along the left side of a highway/roadway when not walking on a sidewalk.
- Pay attention, obey traffic rules, and make eye contact with drivers if possible to make sure they can see you.
- At night wear retro-reflective outdoor clothing/shoes or lights to make yourself more visible. Avoid wearing dark clothing.

Bicyclists:

- Ride at least 3 feet from the curb or parked vehicles and in a straight line. Don't swerve in and out around parked vehicles.
- Always ride in the same direction as traffic (right side of the road).
- Obey all traffic laws like any other vehicle.
- Wear a bicycle helmet and wear bright colors during the day and retro-reflective items at night along with headlights/taillights.

Motorists:

- Yield to pedestrians when crossing a sidewalk or entering an alley or driveway.
- Yield to pedestrians crossing at an intersection or crosswalk on a "walk" signal or green light if there is no walk signal.
- Yield to pedestrians crossing a highway within a marked or unmarked crosswalk at an intersection with no traffic/control lights.
- Remember that bicycles are vehicles; they belong on the road.
- Leave at least 3' when passing bicycles (more at higher speeds) and change lanes to pass any bicycle traveling in a narrow lane.

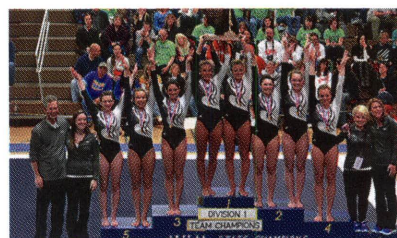
Southwood Glen Elementary celebrated their 20th Anniversary and created an all-school time capsule.

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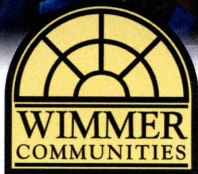

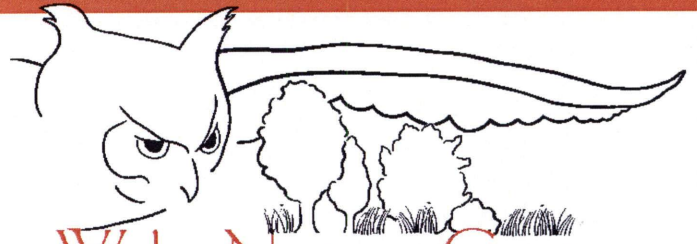
