The City is excited and honored to welcome The Wall That Heals (TWTH), a three-quarter scale replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and Mobile Education Center, to Franklin June 29-July 3! TWTH truck will roll into Franklin on Tuesday, June 28, and be escorted to Franklin High School from The Rock Sports Complex, 7900 W. Crystal Ridge Drive, at approximately 2 p.m. The Franklin Police Department will lead TWTH truck, followed by police, fire, and several motorcycle groups, out of The Rock Sports Complex parking lot, turn left (east) onto Rawson Avenue, to right (south) onto S. 51st Street to the Franklin High School parking lot on the left at 8222 S. 51st Street. All are welcome to line up and observe the procession along this route. There will be a brief arrival ceremony to include photographs and a few words from Mayor Steve Olson. After TWTH is set up, there will be a soft opening on Wednesday, June 29th, at 6 p.m., for volunteer training, and

#### Franklin Citizen Police Academy

Police Chief Rick Oliva has announced Class No.
31 of the Franklin Police Department Citizen
Police Academy which will begin Monday,
September 19, 2022, run for 11 consecutive
weeks, and conclude on Monday, November 28,
2022, with a graduation ceremony. Classes meet
on Monday evenings from 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m.,
usually in the Franklin Police Department

usually in the Franklin Police Department community classroom. Additionally, each graduate may participate in a ridealong with officers on the street.

The Franklin Police Department's mission is to establish and maintain a course of instruction for citizens to familiarize themselves with the operations of the Police Department and the profession of law enforcement. This 11-week academy presents an overview of all aspects of law enforcement such as: patrol operations, crime scene processing, investigations, SWAT, K-9 unit, dispatch/communications, fire and emergency medical services, and much more. Students will have an opportunity to present concerns and questions regarding public safety in the City and learn how citizens and the police can work together to fight crime in the community. Department employees present each session and interact with participants on a very approachable level—the aim is to inform, instruct, and involve citizens.

#### Applicants must meet the following criteria:

- Live or work in the Franklin community (preference is given to Franklin citizens).
- Submit a written application.
- Pass a background check (no felony convictions).
- Be 18 years of age (16 and 17 year olds may attend with parent or guardian).

There is no cost to attend; however, class size is limited. If interested in attending, contact Police Officer Gary Wallace at gwallace@franklinwi.gov. Applications are available in the Franklin Police Department lobby, on the Franklin Police Department Facebook page, or can be sent via email.

**Meet Your Fire Inspectors**—The Franklin Fire Department is required by State Statutes to inspect every public building and place of employment at least once per year, and, for most occupancy types, twice per year. This includes nearly every business, school, place of worship, and multi-family residential building, as well as non-occupied structures such as cell towers and lift stations. Inspections of large properties such as a large manufacturing facility, office building, or apartment complex, can take an inspector an entire day to perform a meaningful, detailed fire inspection, and each new building or complex that goes up represents an annual obligation for inspections for the life of the building. Given Franklin's size (34.5 square miles) and current rate of development, keeping up with the fire inspection workload has been a significant task.



From August of 2017 until present, Jill Glanz has been the sole Community Risk Reduction Specialist (the formal title for fire inspector). Previously, Jill was the long-time Public Relations Officer for the North Shore Fire Department, and she has been very successful in enforcing code compliance through public education and by working with property owners to correct compliance issues, rather than citing minor violations. She is the public "face" of the Fire Department to most Franklin businesses, and enjoys every opportunity for positive public interaction and education.

As of April 2022, Jill is now joined by James Hilleshiem. James will divide his time equally performing fire inspections in both Franklin and Oak Creek. Both municipalities are experiencing similar growth, and were seeking part-time Fire Inspectors to mitigate the challenges of meeting the ever-expanding and permanent increase in inspection-related workloads. The respective Fire Chiefs and City Administrators negotiated an Intergovernmental Agreement whereby James was hired as a Franklin employee, but the two departments jointly fund the shared full-time position. James was selected from a highly-qualified pool of applicants, yet at substantial cost savings to taxpayers of both communities. A Franklin resident, James recently retired from the 128th Air National Guard base at General Mitchell International Airport, where he served as a certified Aircraft Rescue Firefighter (ARFF) and Crew Chief of Fire Prevention. Like Jill, he is highly enthusiastic about public engagement and community education.

#### **Upcoming Construction Projects**

#### S. 76th Street Bridge Rehabilitation

WisDOT and Milwaukee County DOT are planning improvements to the S. 76th Street bridge to correct bridge deteriorations. Rehabilitation work will include bridge deck overlay, expansion joint replacement, approach slab replacement, steel girder painting, and median modifications. The median modifications will increase the shoulder width on the bridge, as well as turning lane capacity for adjacent Loomis Road on ramps. Construction is scheduled for Summer 2022 and no detours are needed as full lanes will be provided through the work zone.

#### W. Forest Home Avenue Reconditioning Project— Hi View Drive to W. Speedway Drive

Milwaukee County is planning a reconditioning project of W. Forest Home Avenue (CTH 00) from Hi View Drive to W. Speedway Drive beginning Spring 2023. It is estimated to be completed in Fall of 2023. Reconditioning of W. Forest Home Avenue will consist of replacing deteriorating pavement and repair of the shoulders. A paved shoulder will also be provided for on-street bicycle accommodations as well as a multi-use path on the west side of W. Forest Home Avenue from Hi View Drive to the southern crossing of the existing Franklin Hike-Bike Trail. W. Forest Home Avenue will be closed and detoured to through traffic from Hi View Drive to W. Speedway Drive. The detour route will use S. Lovers Lane Road and W. Loomis Road. It is anticipated that W. St. Martins Road and W. Rawson Avenue will remain open during construction.

#### Franklin Public Schools is Planning for the Future

MR. JIM MILZER, FPS Assistant Superintendent of Business and Operations

With the increase in new home building and several new home developments seeking approval in Franklin, there will be many additional students attending the Franklin Public Schools in the future.

To monitor the growth in Franklin, the District works closely with the City of Franklin to stay informed of new subdivisions and home building permits. The southwest corner of Franklin has a large amount of open land where most of the new development is expected to occur. Projections show that when they are fully developed, which could take up to five years, Country Dale Elementary School will be over capacity.

To prepare for the projected increase in students, specifically at the elementary level, the District has purchased 228 acres of land on Ryan Road at 92nd Street. This property will provide enough space for two elementary schools if needed, as well as space for additional athletic or recreation fields. The City has also inquired about building a recreation trail on the property. The graphic below shows the location of possible new home developments along Ryan Road.



- 1. Concept Plan for 87 homes, has not come to the City for approval
- 2. Ryan Meadows, 79 homes, 12 under construction
- 3. Duplex Units, 26 units, not fully approved yet
- 4. Cape Crossing, 142 homes, not fully approved yet, 4 to 5 years to complete

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) requires drinking water utilities to provide an annual Consumer Confidence Report to help consumers understand where their drinking water comes from so they can make informed decisions about their health and protection of the environment.

#### TREATED WATER QUALITY

Listed on the following pages are contaminants detected in Franklin's drinking water during 2021. All detects are less than what federal and state regulations allow. Not listed are the results of nearly 3,000 tests conducted for approximately 150 contaminants that were not found during water testing.

The State Department of Natural Resources allows the Franklin Water Utility to monitor for certain contaminants less than once per year because the concentrations of these contaminants do not change frequently. Therefore, some of this data, though representative, is more than one year old.

The information enclosed is based on the testing conducted in the year 2021. Every year testing occurs; results for the year 2022 will be available in the next annual report. The Franklin Water Utility is committed to providing its 8,600 customers with the highest-quality drinking water that meets and exceeds standards more stringent than federal and state requirements. Please read this brochure for additional information.

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#### SPECIAL HEALTH INFORMATION AVAILABLE

Drinking water, including bottled water, may be reasonably expected to contain small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does *not* necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-4791.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

#### **LEAD AND COPPER**

The City has never failed any tests for lead or other heavy metals. Since the beginning, Franklin's Water Utility has been diligent in design standards for our facilities.

Infants and children who drink water containing lead in excess of the action level could experience delays in their physical or mental development. Children could show slight deficits in attention span and learning abilities. Adults who drink this water over many years could develop kidney problems or high blood pressure.

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially in pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with older service lines and home plumbing. The Franklin Water Utility is responsible for providing high-quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for at least 30 seconds (two minutes should be long enough) before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Information on lead in drinking water, testing methods, and steps you can take to minimize exposure is available from the Safe Drinking Hotline or at www.epa.gov/safewater/lead. Lead and copper results are from July 21, 2020.

#### WATER CONSERVATION

Factors such as drinking water treatment, facility improvements, wastewater treatment, and the energy used for treating, pumping, and heating water are factored into the price that we charge for water. Although tap water is a bargain at \$5.04 per 1,000 gallons when compared to most other products we consume, the total cost of water usage can add up quickly.

We must also remember that water is a limited resource; we will never have any more water on earth than what we have right now. So while water use is necessary for us to survive and to produce and process most of the products we use on a daily basis, it also pays for us to protect it as a natural resource for use by future generations.

Most water is used in the bathroom. The largest water user in any household is the toilet with 2 to 7 gallons per flush. Flushes account for approximately 27% of the water used in a typical home. Showers, with a flow rate of 2 gallons per minute, account for around 17% of the water used, while other bathroom uses such as baths and faucets account for around 10%. The second highest water user is the washing machine. At around 41 gallons per load, clothes washing accounts for about 22% of the water used in a typical household.

#### UNREGULATED CONTAMINANTS

Unregulated contaminants are those for which the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has not established drinking water standards. The purpose of unregulated contaminant monitoring is to assist the EPA in determining the occurrence of unregulated contaminants in drinking water and whether future regulation is warranted. The EPA requires us to participate in this monitoring. Below are test results from 2018 – 2020. We sample from the Utility's entry point and several locations throughout the distribution system. All results were within the sampling parameters.

#### **DEFINITIONS**

**AL = Action Level:** The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

**HAL** = **Health Advisory Level:** The concentration of a contaminant which, if exceeded, poses a health risk and may require a system to post a public notice.

**Level 1 Assessment:** A Level 1 assessment is a study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system.

**Level 2 Assessment:** A Level 2 assessment is a very detailed study of the water system to identify potential problems and determine, if possible, why an E. coli MCL violation has occurred or why total coliform bacteria have been found in our water system, or both, on multiple occasions.

MCL = Maximum Contaminant Level: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

MCLG = Maximum Contaminant Level Goal: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety. MFL = million fibers per liter

MRDL = Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

MRDLG = Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level Goal: The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect the benefits of the use of disinfectants to control microbial contaminants.

mrem/year = millirems per year (a measure of radiation absorbed by the body).

**NTU** = Nephelometric Turbidity Units

pCi/L = picocuries per liter (a measure of radioactivity)
ppm = parts per million, or milligrams per liter (mg/l)

ppin parts per minion, or minigrams per mer (mg/1

**ppb** = parts per billion, or micrograms per liter (ug/l)

**ppt** = parts per trillion, or nanograms per liter

**ppq** = parts per quadrillion, or pictograms per liter

SMCL= Secondary drinking water standards or Secondary Maximum Contaminant Levels for contaminants that affect taste, odor, or appearance of the drinking water. The SMCLs do not represent health standards.

**TCR** = Total Coliform Rule

TT = Treatment Technique: A required process intended to reduce the level of a contaminant in drinking water.
