2023 Adopted Budget & 2022 Property Tax Bills On The Way

The Franklin Common Council adopted it's 2023 budget on November 15th which continues to focus on maintaining City services, protecting City assets, and using resources responsibly to prudently serve the City of Franklin.

Property tax bills are scheduled to be mailed during the week of December 12th and will reflect the total property taxes to be collected from all of the applicable taxing jurisdictions including the City of Franklin, the local school district, MATC, MMSD, and Milwaukee County. Under the law, the City is required to collect the property taxes for 7 different taxing authorities.

2023 Park Reservations

2023 Park Permit applications for Franklin groups or residents for reserving Lions Legend Park (Lions or Vernon E. Barg Pavilions), Market Square, Ken Windl Pavilion, Franklin Woods Pavilion, or Pleasant View Pavilion, will be accepted at Vernon E. Barg Pavilion City Hall, 9229 W. Loomis Road, beginning Tuesday, January 3, 2023. Applications must be made in person and permits will be issued on a first-come, first-serve basis. The front entrance of City Hall will open at 7:30 a.m. at which time numbers will be handed out. Once you receive a number,

you must remain in the City Hall lobby until the Clerk's Office opens for business at 8:30 a.m. Park permit applications will be accepted and processed in the order of numbers distributed. No telephone or mail-in applications are accepted. Non-Franklin groups may apply after April 1st.

- Lions Pavilion, 8050 S. Legend Drive, has available an open-air pavilion, electricity, picnic tables, water, and grills.
- Vernon E. Barg Pavilion, 8717 W. Drexel Avenue, has available an open-air pavilion, indoor serving area, electricity, picnic tables, water, and grills.
- Ken Windl Pavilion, 11615 W. Rawson Avenue, has an indoor air-conditioned/heated gathering space (maximum of 50 people), tables/chairs, kitchenette, picnic tables, electricity, and water.
- Franklin Woods Pavilion, 3723 W. Puetz Road, has available an open-air pavilion, electricity, picnic tables within the pavilion, and water. There are no grills available. A gas grill may be brought, however, no charcoal grills allowed. Note: Kayla's Playground is not reservable—the playground and patic area must be shared with the general public.
- Pleasant View Pavilion, 4620 W. Evergreen Street, has available an open-air pavilion, indoor serving area, electricity, picnic tables, and water. Maximum of 50 people.
- Market Square, 11230 W. Franklin Street, has available a gazebo, picnic tables, and electricity. There are no restrooms or water available at Market Square.
- Playground equipment, tennis courts, and volleyball courts, where available at all of the above listed parks, must be shared with the general public.

Rental hours for all park pavilions are 11 a.m. to 8 p.m. Lions Pavilion, Vernon E. Barg Pavilion, Franklin Woods Pavilion, and Market Square are available from April 15-October 31. Ken Windl and Pleasant View Park pavilions are available year-round.

Snow & Ice Control



Residents with concerns regarding winter street maintenance may call the Public Works Department at 414-425-2592. Regular hours are Monday-Friday, 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., or whenever weather conditions warrant winter street maintenance. If no one is available to take your call, please leave a message and someone will get back to you. If immediate attention is required, please call the Police Department at 414-425-2522.

Tips & Street/Sidewalk Winter Maintenance

- To maintain safety on City streets and sidewalks, the City of Franklin, through its Municipal Code, prohibits any person from throwing, blowing, placing, or piling any snow or ice on any public street, public place, or public property. This also pertains to depositing plowed snow in roadside ditches and public road right-of-way of yours or neighboring properties. Artificial snow accumulations can create a traffic or pedestrian hazard. Violators may be ticketed.
- Please place garbage and recycling containers 2 feet back from the street during a snowfall. This will help prevent the rolling snow from snowplows from covering or tipping them. Garbage cans should never be placed in the street.
- The owner, occupant, or person in charge of any building or lot fronting or adjoining any street is responsible for clearing the sidewalk abutting such building or lot of snow and ice. After snow or ice has formed on any sidewalk, the sidewalk must be cleared within 24 hours. When ice has formed on any sidewalk that cannot be removed, the walk must be kept safe by applying an abrasive material or salt within 24 hours. If any sidewalk is neglected, the Department of Public Works shall have the snow and/or ice removed and will charge the responsible party.
- Mailbox Replacement Policy: The City will repair any mailbox that has been determined to have been struck by a City snowplow or replace it with a standard mailbox; however, damage to mailboxes caused by snow coming off City snowplows will NOT be repaired. Mailboxes and posts are expected to be in good condition and strong enough to withstand the force of snow coming off the City snowplows.
- Winter Parking Regulations: City Municipal Code states that from December 1 to April 1 there is no parking allowed on any City street between 2 a.m. and 7 a.m., Mondays through Saturdays, and between 3 a.m. and 7 a.m. on Sundays, except physicians on emergency calls. Permission to park contrary to these provisions may be granted by the Police Department upon request for the reason of the emergency and unforeseen conditions, provided that such parking will not interfere with snow removal operations. If a snow emergency is declared, then no parking is allowed on any City street between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.
- Sump Pump Discharge: City Code prohibits the discharge of water from sump pumps upon any public street or highway from November 15 to April 15, as this leads to ice build-up on streets. During this period, property owners shall discharge water from their sumps onto their lawn at a point not more than 10 feet from their building.

How are my taxes calculated?

The approved tax levies from all of the taxing jurisdictions are divided by the assessed valuation, as certified by the Board of Review, to determine the tax rates. Franklin has multiple school districts; therefore, there are three different tax rates that may apply to a citizen's tax bill. If you compare your tax bill to another property's tax bill, please make sure the tax bills have the same taxing authorities in order to complete a true cost comparison.

Where can I find the 2022 tax rates?

Tax rates are shown on the insert that is included with your 2022 Property Tax Bill. This insert shows the tax rates for all properties by school district as well as a breakdown by taxing entity.

What are the credits on my tax bill?

A Lottery and Gaming Credit is provided by the State for qualifying property owners for their primary residence only. If the credit was on your 2021 Real Estate Tax Bill, or you filed the 2022 Lottery Credit form, the credit will be on your 2022 Real Estate Tax Bill. If the credit is not on your tax bill and you are eligible in 2022, it can be deducted from your 2022 tax bill until January 31, 2023. A First Dollar Credit is provided for all taxable property with improvements, based on the equalized value of the school tax rate. Amounts vary by school district for both credits.

What are the additional charges on my tax bill?

Tax bills may contain other charges such as the solid waste fee, annual payments of outstanding special assessments, delinquent sewer and water bills as of November 15, and other unpaid miscellaneous bills outstanding at that time. All additional charges are due by January 31, 2023, and do not qualify for installment payments.

What if I do not receive my tax bill?

Tax bills are sent to the property owner of record. For properties recently purchased in the August-November time period, the City may not have received the transfer information from Milwaukee County and those tax bills will be sent to the seller. If needed, you may print a bill at www.franklinwi.gov (click the Property Taxes icon then "Property Tax Web Portal/Pay Your Taxes Online"), request the bill from the seller, or contact the Treasury Office to obtain the property tax information.

The annual salary for the Office of Mayor is \$16,800 plus \$4,800 for mileage and expenses, and the annual salary for the Office of Alderperson is \$7,200 plus \$1,800 for mileage and expenses. Nomination papers for the above-listed offices are now available for circulation and must be filed (along with other required documents) in the office of the City Clerk no later than 5 p.m. on January 3, 2023. If interested in obtaining the documents required for these offices, or would like additional information on the Election process, please contact the City Clerk's Office at 414-425-7500.

Property Tax Bill Payments

Property tax bills are scheduled to be mailed during the week of December 12, 2022. Payment is due January 31, 2023 and may be paid in the following ways:

- Online: Pay your taxes online via the "Property Taxes/Tax Web Portal" link under the "Quick Links" on the home page of the City's website at www.franklinwi.gov. To pay your taxes online, please refer to the instructions included with your tax bill. There is a nominal fee for paying your taxes online, and payment will be via an electronic check through your bank. Online payments take one business day to process, so please plan accordingly related to due dates.
- Mail: Payment is deposited the day received. Please include the payment coupon. Confirmation of your payment is available in the Property Tax Web Portal on the City's website after payment is receipted-see www.franklinwi.gov, click the "Property Taxes" icon and then "Property Tax Web Portal/Pay Your Taxes Online". Once you are viewing your property information in the Property Tax Web Portal, you can locate the payment information on the right-hand side of the "Taxes" tab.
- Delivery to Drop Box: The City has a drop box located right outside of the main entrance to City Hall that is available 24/7. The drop box is a good alternative to standing in line to pay your taxes or for submitting payment when the Treasury Office is closed. Please include the payment coupon, attached to your tax bill, with payment.
- In Person: In person payments may be made at City Hall, 9229 W. Loomis Road. Depending upon demand, wait times vary, with the longest wait times occurring near December 31st. Your payment coupon will facilitate the payment process and a receipt will be provided. Checks and money orders are encouraged for your safety and speed of processing.

Daily payment hours are 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday. For tax payment purposes, payment hours will be extended on the following dates: Monday-Friday, Dec. 12-16, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Monday-Thursday, Dec. 19-22, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Tuesday-Thursday, Dec. 27-29, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Treasury Office will be CLOSED December 23-26 and December 30-January 2.

Ghana-Based Niche Cocoa Opening Location in Franklin Business Park

On October 4, 2022, local, state, and federal officials announced that Niche Cocoa, a cocoa company from the western Africa nation of Ghana, is turning the 44,000 square foot space at 9705 S. Oakwood Park Drive in the Franklin Business Park into its first North American manufacturing facility. Niche produces high-quality semi-finished cocoa products for chocolate, ice cream, and bakery industries.

The Wisconsin Economic Development Corp (WEDC) confirmed that this would mark the largest food and beverage investment by an Africa-based company in the U.S., and the largest Ghana foreign direct investment ever in Wisconsin. Niche chose Wisconsin due to the strength of the food and beverage industry; and, with cocoa powder, as well as chocolates, the dairy industry is very important.

Expected to be fully operational by January 2023, Niche will initially employ around 24 employees to process approximately 1,200 containers of Ghana-imported cocoa cake each year into cocoa powder, finished chocolate, and cocoa liquor for nationwide distribution.

Holiday Safety Reminders

Child Supervision Goes A Long Way

- Toys should be durable/unbreakable for children who are teething.
- Be sure to check that batteries are secured by screws and cannot be removed.
- Always check labels and for parts that could become loose or break off.
- Never leave children unattended by water and ice.
- Keep holiday plants (poinsettias) out of reach of small children as they can be poisonous if ingested. Poison Control number is 1-800-222-1222.
- At home or when visiting relatives, make sure all medications have child-resistant packaging and are put up, away, and out of sight.
- Have a "Kid-Free Zone" of at least 3 feet in areas where hot food/drinks are prepared.

Fire Safety

- Never leave fire, heat, or stove unattended.
- Adopt A Hydrant: Shovel 3 feet all around hydrant and a 3 foot path from the hydrant to the roadway for firefighter access.



- Don't block exits.
- Never use damaged accessories, frayed or cracked cords, or lighting sources.
- Be sure all electric outlets used are GFI.
- Choose holiday decorations that are non-flammable and labeled "fire-resistant".
- Make sure fresh-cut trees are well watered, secure from tipping, and kept away from heat sources.
- Turn off holiday lights when you sleep and leave home.
- Prepare and check fireplaces before the first burn.
- Choose battery-operated candles great gift idea too!
- Give space heaters 3 feet of space all around, plug directly into a wall outlet (not a power strip or extension cord), and unplug when not present or sleeping.

Remember Your Loved Ones During the Holidays

 Check on your loved ones more frequently, making sure they have a "File of Life"—available at the Franklin Fire Department, 8901 W. Drexel Avenue.



- Make sure home addresses are clearly visible from the roadway for emergency responders.
- Be alert for falling and tripping hazards: cords, rugs, toys, ice, ladders, snow, etc.
- Make sure homes are being heated appropriately.
- Check smoke and carbon monoxide detectors—have a 10-year life span—a great gift idea!
- Dress for the weather and plan ahead if you travel.
- Help someone shovel. Be aware of cardiac symptoms and cardiac arrest when shoveling.

Annual Pet Licensing

Pet licenses are required to be obtained annually by Franklin residents who own a dog, cat, or tiny horse that is at least 5 months of age on January 1st, or 5 months of age within the license year. License applications are due by April 1st of each year, or within 30 days from the adoption of your new pet. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate issued by your veterinarian is required as proof of vaccination.

The cost of a pet license is as follows:

Altered Pet-\$12 Unaltered Pet-\$24 Late Fee for Altered Pet-\$6 Late Fee for Unaltered Pet-\$12

The City prefers that you pay for your pet license directly through the City of Franklin either in person at the Treasurer's



Office at City Hall, by mail, or by use of the drop box outside of City Hall at 9229 W. Loomis Road, Franklin, WI 53132. Please be sure to include your pet license application (available online at www.franklinwi.gov, click on "I Want To..." and then "License a Pet"), vaccination records, and a check made payable to the City of Franklin.

The Milwaukee Area Domestic Animal Control Commission (MADACC) has overall responsibility for issuing pet licenses in Milwaukee County. As such, pet licenses may also be applied for online by visiting the MADACC website at www.madacc.org. Payments made via MADACC's website can be made by check or by credit card.



Milwaukee County Home Repair

The Milwaukee County Housing Division offers no-interest loans to income-qualified homeowners in the suburban communities of Milwaukee County, *excluding* the Village of River Hills and the Cities of Milwaukee and West Allis, through its Home Repair Program. Loans or grants are available through the program.



Owner-occupied homes are eligible if the homeowner(s) meet income guidelines and property requirements (see income guidelines in the chart below). These funds can be used to make emergency repairs, correct code violations, or improve the living quality of your home. Common items repaired include hot water heaters, furnaces, sewer laterals, roofs, siding, trim, windows, porches, foundations, plumbing, and electrical. Projects funded by Home Repair loans will be secured by a lien on the home.

Program staff will help you through the application process, work with you to create a scope of work, and screen contractors to make sure they are right for your project. Once a contractor is selected, program staff put together an agreement with the contractor and oversee the project while in progress. Upon completion, the County pays the contractor directly. The homeowner repays the County according to the terms of the loan.

The City of Franklin has been awarded grant funds specific to residents of Franklin. For residents who qualify, a portion of the project cost could be covered by the City's grant funds. Grant amounts may be up to half the project cost, generally targeted for up to \$5,000, and do not have to be paid back. Fiscal Responsibility to the Community



Franklin Public Schools continues to be excellent stewards of the community's investment in our schools. At the end of October, the Franklin Public Schools budget for 2022-23 was presented to the Board of Education. Part of the approved budget revolved around defeasing \$3.81 million of our long-term referendum debt. A defeasance is a prepayment of debt, similar to paying extra on your mortgage.



Even with the addition of this debt defeasance, we are proud to state that the mill rate for FPS will drop and property taxes will decrease by \$59 per \$100,000 of assessed property value.



Hours: Tuesdays and Thursdays, 8 a.m. to 3 p.m., excluding holidays. Items Accepted: brush (up to 6" in diameter), used motor oil, used oil filters (uncrushed with oil drained from them), used antifreeze (2 gal. max per visit), car/truck batteries, clean glass bottles and jars, clean plastic containers with Codes 1-7, clean tin and aluminum cans, newspapers, flattened cardboard boxes.

Items NOT Accepted: garden debris, grass clippings, leaves, household trash, styrofoam, plastic bags, windows, mirrors, glass cookware, light bulbs, tires, construction debris, appliances, and electronics.

Items NOT Accepted: appliances (including microwaves), electronics, humidifiers, dehumidifiers, water

heaters, furnaces, and hazardous waste such as gas, antifreeze, oil and paint.

BRUSH AND LEAF PICK-UPS

There will be brush and leaf pickups beginning May 8, September 11, October 30, and November 13. Brush and leaves must be curbside and next to the driveway at 7 a.m. on these designated Mondays. Leaves and yard waste must be in paper compostable yard waste bags or 32-gallon or smaller containers that can be emptied into the collection truck. PLASTIC BAGS OF ANY KIND ARE NOT ALLOWED AND WILL NOT BE PICKED UP, which includes no "compostable green" or biodegradable plastic bags. Brush is limited to ONE pile no larger than 4' x 4' x 5' per household with branches less than 6" in diameter and a pile weight less than 50 lbs. Brush must be piled or bundled (bundled piles are preferred).

CHRISTMAS TREE PICK-UP

Christmas tree pickup by the Franklin Department of Public Works for the next 2 years will be 7 a.m. on January 9, 2023 and January 8, 2024. Trees should be placed at the end of the driveway no more than 24 hours before the scheduled pickup and should be free of decorations, lights, and tree stands. Trees should not be covered with snow or be placed in a bag. (Wreaths are to be disposed of with the regular garbage.)

SHARPS (NEEDLES, SYRINGES, LANCETS)

Wisconsin Law requires that sharps be properly discarded. The City of Franklin Health Department is a sharps collection site for residents only. Biohazard containers may be purchased from the Health Department. Office hours are 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday. Call 425-9101 for further information. Sharps may not be placed in household trash.

SPECIAL PICK-UP - To dispose of large amounts of carpet, large furniture, electronics, and refuse not considered "regular household garbage", call Johns Disposal Service at 1-888-473-4701 or 262-473-4700 to arrange a special pickup and for pricing (prepay by credit card only).



Garbage (brown cart) and recycling (green cart) are picked up weekly, both on your scheduled garbage collection day. Cart Placement: The arrows on the lid of the carts must point to the street. Handles and wheels should face away from the street. The garbage cart should be placed within 2 feet of the street on one side of the driveway and the recycle cart should be placed within 2 feet of the street on the other side of the driveway. Please keep 6 feet of clearance between the carts and other objects, especially

mailboxes and vehicles. Carts should not be placed in the street.

Items to be placed in Green Recycling Cart:

aluminum cans, clean aluminum foil, tin/steel/aerosol cans, empty/dried paint cans, glass bottles/jars, #1-7 plastic, milk/soup/juice cartons, newspaper, magazines, books, mail, school/office paper, brown corrugated cardboard, cereal/shoe boxes, paper bags, shredded paper secured in a clear plastic bag. No other recycling should be placed in bags.
