#### City of Franklin 2024 Annual Budget

Mayor John R. Nelson is strategically working on his City of Franklin Recommended 2024 Budget, which is expected to be released by the beginning of October. Once released, the Common Council will refer the proposed 2024 budget to the Finance Committee, scheduling budget review meetings in early October. These meetings will be held to review the budget in detail. The Finance Committee will then present its recommendations to the Common Council mid-October.

Check the City calendar at www.franklinwi.gov for more information, as additional budget meetings may be scheduled as needed. A public hearing and final budget consideration are planned for a Special Common Council Meeting on Tuesday, November 14th, beginning at 6:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers at City Hall. All budget-related meetings provide a 'citizen comment period' where citizens are encouraged to provide input and ask questions. #### **Buckthorn Identification & Control**

- Buckthorn invades oak forests, riparian woods, savannas, prairies, old fields, and roadsides. It thrives particularly on welldrained soils, and can be problematic in green infrastructure storm water facilities designed to capture water and drain within a short amount of time.
- Common Buckthorn has ovate or elliptic leaves, with prominent veins curving toward tip. Mostly opposite leaves, 1-2.5" long, with tiny teeth. Leaves remain on plants and stay green into fall. Bark is gray to brown with prominent light-colored lenticels. Cut bark exposes an orange inner cambium layer.
- Glossy Buckthorn is similar to Common Buckthorn. Leaves are mostly opposite, with greater number of veins. Upper surface of leaves are shiny with undersides dull.
- Abundant clusters of round, black, pea-sized fruit ripen on female plants in late summer that are dispersed by birds and mammals.
   Fruits remain on plants into winter after all the leaves have fallen.

#### Control

- Mechanical: Small plants may be hand pulled. Prescribed fire for seedlings. Larger plants can be dug or pulled using a leverage tool such as a weed wrench. Girdling trees requires stripping the bark to expose the inner hardwood at a minimum of 6 inches. Effective any time of year.
- Chemical: Cut-stump treatment with glyphosate in late fall is very effective. Cut stump, basal bark spray, or hand-wicking treatment around the stem with triclopyr in late fall through the winter to reduce environmental impact of chemical application.

### Call <u>911</u> In An Emergency!

In recent months, the Franklin Fire Department has seen an increase in residents and businesses calling the Franklin fire stations directly, using our 7-digit, non-emergency phone number in situations where they need immediate help. Many times, they say "We don't want to bother you" or "It's really not a serious emergency".

A risk in calling the fire station directly, is the chance that our crew will be out previous handling emergency a response and no one will be present to answer your phone call in a timely manner. Please, if you need the help of our firefighters and paramedics, call 911! Our 911 dispatchers will quickly assist in getting the help you need from the closest fire station. If your request is indeed a non-critical circumstance, our crews are instructed to respond in a "non-emergent" mode, meaning we do not use our warning lights and sirens-much safer for everyone involved.

#### **Bus Rapid Transit for 27th Street**





Milwaukee County Transit System (MCTS) is planning a Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) route along the 27th Street corridor connecting Franklin, Oak Creek, Greenfield, Milwaukee, and Glendale to jobs, healthcare, and education. The route includes 33 stops along the 18-mile route and is the second route planned for MCTS's CONNECT BRT system. The project is currently in the environmental review and design phase and is seeking public input on key project features.

#### What a GREEN SUMMER in Franklin!

Thank you, Franklin! This summer, the Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District (MMSD) and the Fresh Coast Guardians worked with City of Franklin residents to install green infrastructure in our neighborhoods. Residents



learned the benefits of managing stormwater where it falls. Green infrastructure (GI), such as rain barrels and rain gardens, capture, absorb, or store rain and melting snow, reducing the storm water runoff that can transport many pollutants to our local waterways. They also reduce the likelihood of flooding and basement backups, beautify neighborhoods, and manage water and sewer costs.

Over 100 rain barrels were installed and 8 rain gardens planted throughout the City of Franklin. Deep-rooted native flowers were also planted at Kayla's Playground.

#### Fall Brush & Leaf Pickups: Sept. 11, Oct. 30 & Nov. 13, 2023



The final 3 brush and leaf pick-ups for 2023 will take place Mondays, September 11, October 30, and November 13. The City's waste hauler will move through the City starting at 7 a.m. on these designated Mondays and work through the week until they are finished. All brush piles and leaves are required to be curbside and next to the driveway by 7 a.m. on these Mondays. Brush and leaves that are not out when the hauler goes by will not be picked up at a later date. Your regular garbage will be picked up on your normal garbage pickup day. Please call 414-425-2592 with any questions.

#### Pick-up will include:

- Brush (tree limbs, bush cuttings, and similar) must be cut to no longer than 5 feet in length and no larger than 6 inches in diameter, must be piled or tied/bundled (preferred), and placed curbside next to your driveway. Each household is limited to one pile no larger than 4'x4'x5' and be 50 pounds or less. Larger piles, multiple piles, and brush thrown in the ditch will not be picked up.
- Leaves must be in paper compostable yard waste bags or 32-gallon or smaller trash containers weighing 50 pounds or less that can be emptied into the collection truck (no limit on number of bags or containers). Plastic bags of any kind are NOT allowed and will not be picked up. Please place bagged leaves away from your regular trash so they will not be missed. Leaves are not to be raked into the street.
- No grass clippings, flowers, stumps, fruit, roots, or other garden debris will be accepted. These items, as well as brush and leaves, may be disposed of at the Waste Management Metro Landfill, 12200 W. South County Line Road (414-529-6180, Hours: Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Saturday, 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.).

## LATERALLY SPEAKING

Plumbing 101: Keep pipes flowing—and avoid costly problems
What's the homeowner's responsibility, what's the City's
responsibility, and little-known facts about when to call a plumber!

Have you ever experienced a basement sewer back-up? The heart-sinking experience of laying eyes on all your sewer water-soaked belongings, the cleaning, the odiferous basement air that seems to linger for weeks? If you've experienced it, you know how exhausting and expensive it can be. But good news: there are things we as homeowners can do to ensure it doesn't happen to us—and to make other plumbing situations keep flowing smoothly. Let's look at who's responsible for what.

The homeowner's responsibility: The sewer lateral under your home. The sewer lateral is the pipe that carries wastewater away from your home to the public sanitary sewer main located under your street. Many homeowners don't realize it, but the sewer lateral is your responsibility-all the way into the street. As that pipe system ages, defects can develop, making it that much more important to make sure your sewer lateral is in good working condition. If your sewer lateral has issues that clog it or make it susceptible to breakage, excess rainwater (also called "clearwater") can overwhelm it and increase the risk of back-up of dirty water. Connected downspouts and foundation drains are common culprits that contribute unwanted excess rainwater to your sewer lateral. Defects in the sewer lateral such as cracks, sags in the pipe joints, and tree root intrusions all allow groundwater to enter your sewer lateral. Homeowners should remove connected downspouts as required in Franklin Municipal Code 190-24 (4). In most situations, foundation drain connections are prohibited and the homeowner is best advised to redirect them to lessen the chance of problems.

To get on top of any potential issues, start by having your sewer lateral inspected by a plumber using video inspection in which a camera is fed through the pipe system to identify any issues and remedies. Request that the plumber record the video inspection and provide you a copy.

The City's responsibility: The sanitary sewer main in front of your home. There are more than 210 miles of sewer main line running through the City of Franklin, all of it the City's responsibility to keep flowing freely. The City performs camera inspections every 6 to 7 years to ensure that all pipes are clean and free of defects. If you live in the City of Franklin and experience a basement sewer backup, please call 414-421-2613. If a back-up occurs late at night, call the non-emergency Police Dispatch at 414-425-2522 and they will have an on-call employee respond.

When else to call a plumber: Two little-known facts. Be aware of two little clues that a sewer lateral problem could be imminent. Call a plumber if you have:

- sewer water backing up through the floor drain, sinks, or toilets.
- debris around the floor drain—this can be evidence that water back-ups are occurring.

Here's another little-known fact: Milwaukee Metropolitan Sewerage District's (MMSD) "Pipe Check" program can cover some of the expense of lateral repair when it's needed. It provides homeowners flat-rate financial incentives as high as \$7,000 that cover a portion of the cost of completing repairs, including lateral replacements, foundation drain disconnections, and lateral lining. #### Poll Worker Requirements Wis. Stat. §7.30(2)(a):

- Be a U.S. Citizen
- **Be 18 years old (except high school student poll workers)**
- Be able to read and write fluently in the English language
- NOT be a candidate for any office to be voted on at the polling place at that election

## HELP WANTED!

#### High School Poll Worker Requirements Wis. Stat. §7.30(2)(am):

- Be 16 or 17 years of age
- Be enrolled in grades 9 to 12 in a public, private or tribal school or home-based private educational program
- Have at least a 3.0 grade point average
- Have written approval of their parent or guardian
- Have written approval of the principal, if GPA is less than a 3.0
- Reside in the City of Franklin

#### Opportunities in Franklin:

- Chief Election Inspector Required to be a qualified elector of the City of Franklin
  - Lead person at polling location
  - Will need 6 hours of training over a two-year time frame
  - Must take baseline training online (additional two hours of training)
- Election Inspector Required to be a qualified elector of Milwaukee County
  - Check in voters
  - Register voters
  - Issue ballots
  - Will need 6 hours of training over a two-year time frame
- Central Count Election Inspector Wis. Stat. §7.53(2m)(b)—Required to be a qualified elector of the City of Franklin
